CEO AND CHAIR'S FOREWORD

LORD MAYOR'S FOREWORD

In 2021-22, Brisbane Sustainability Agency continued to ensure Brisbane remained the cleanest, greenest and most sustainable capital city in Australia.

This was Brisbane Sustainability Agency's first year of operation following the merger of Green Heart CitySmart and Oxley Creek Transformation.

Since the merger, Brisbane Sustainability Agency has been focussed on supporting Brisbane City Council's long-term plan for a clean, green and sustainable city, while enhancing liveability outcomes for residents.

In its first year, Brisbane Sustainability Agency has continued delivering important legacy programs across the city, such as the Oxley Creek Transformation project, Flood Resilient Homes Program and Resilient Clubs Support Program, while seizing new opportunities to help make Brisbane the nation's most sustainable city.

Council's Flood Resilient Homes Program was designed to help residents prepare for, live through and recover from overland flow flooding. The benefit of the program was evident during Brisbane's February 2022 flood event. The program's success will inform future flood resilience efforts and initiatives across the city, such as the Rebuild and Recover Flood Resilient Communities Program, which is already helping to connect community organisations with flood resilient building and design experts, to support community organisations in understanding how to build back better following flood events.

Significantly, May 2022 saw the successful delivery of the Green Heart Fair in Brisbane's biggest new park in 50 years, Victoria Park / Barrambin, which is set to be a signature event destination in future. This represents a new era for the much-loved Green Heart Fair program that has been Brisbane's most popular sustainability event for 10 years. In addition to an annual Green Heart Fair, the new format features pop-up events across Brisbane, to reach new pockets of the city with sustainable living initiatives.

Brisbane Sustainability Agency is also continuing to realise Council's vision to transform the 20km Oxley Creek corridor, from the Brisbane River to Warril Parkland at Larapinta, into a world-class green, lifestyle and leisure destination. Notably, Archerfield Wetlands, a 150-hectare site that will become a unique destination within the Oxley Creek corridor for all Brisbane residents and visitors, was opened to the public for the first time, launching a network of discovery tracks and trails through the site to give the community access to this rare, natural beauty, just 12km from the Brisbane's Central Business District.

I extend my thanks and appreciation to the Brisbane Sustainability Agency Board, management, and staff for their hard work and dedication over the past 12 months, in continuing to deliver signature environmental and sustainability outcomes and helping ensure Brisbane gets even better.

On behalf of Brisbane Sustainability Agency, we are pleased to present the 2021-22 Annual Report.

Over the past year, we have helped to shape and deliver an exciting series of initiatives to build a more sustainable, resilient city and continue to collaborate with our stakeholders and partners to deliver measurable sustainability outcomes for Brisbane residents, businesses and community groups.

We were excited to deliver the Green Heart Fair in May 2022, welcoming over 10,000 visitors to the event at Victoria Park / Barrambin, for the first time. We also celebrated Council's WasteSMART Brisbane Awards at Brisbane City Hall, recognising those in our community helping to create a clean and green Brisbane. Brisbane Sustainability Agency's vital program of works in climate resilience was tested during the February/March 2022 flood event. Following the flood event, our expertise in program delivery was showcased by resounding positive feedback from participants of the Flood Resilient Homes Program and the crucial role Brisbane Sustainability Agency has played in Council's Flood Resilience Action Plan as the trusted delivery partner of Council's Rebuild and Recover Flood Resilient Communities Program.

Our successful partnership with Brisbane City Council in 2021-22 included the launch of the Rebuild and Recover Flood Resilient Communities Program, helping connect community organisations with flood resilient building and design experts, to support community organisation to understand how to build back better following the February/ March 2022 flood event.

We also continued our work in the sustainability initiatives by continuing to deliver the Resilient Clubs Support Program and Brisbane Carbon Challenge for Brisbane City Council, and launched an online platform, the Sustainable Business Hub, to support Brisbane's small and medium businesses with resources, case studies, tools and offers to operate more sustainably and lower their operational costs.

Delivering Council's Oxley Creek Transformation Project continues to be a landmark initiative for Brisbane Sustainability Agency. Notably in 2021-22 the project reached exciting milestones for the community and local environment with the completion of the construction of the 3.7km Archerfield Wetlands Discovery Trail and receiving Development Approval of the Archerfield Wetlands District Parkland to allow construction to commence in 2022-23.

This year's Annual Report looks back at what Brisbane Sustainability Agency has achieved in our first year and sets a solid foundation for an exciting future. Thank you to all our employees and partners for their contribution to the achievements of Brisbane Sustainability Agency in 2021-22, and continued dedication towards an exciting program of natural environment, sustainability and climate resilience initiatives in 2022-23.

We look forward to delivering signature environmental and sustainability projects and outcomes for Brisbane and appreciate the support of Brisbane City Council over the past 12 months.

Through an impressive array of events, programs and projects, Brisbane Sustainability Agency is focussed on delivering legacy outcomes for Brisbane.

A SUSTAINABLE AGENCY FOR A SUSTAINABLE CITY

Sustainability is at the heart of everything we do. Cities are uniquely positioned to play a crucial role in sustainable development through urban planning, community engagement, supply chain management and low emissions built environment solutions.

In Australia, Brisbane has a unique opportunity to be a sustainability leader due to its clean air, green open spaces, rich biodiversity and the commitment of the nation's largest local government, Brisbane City Council. Brisbane Sustainability Agency are helping Council deliver on its sustainability commitments in many ways.

To manage our operational carbon footprint, Brisbane Sustainability Agency are included in Brisbane City Council's Climate Active certification, measuring and offsetting approximately 1,200 tonnes of CO2 emissions annually (tCO2-e).



Brisbane Sustainability Agency are helping to build climate adaption through our resilience program of works, including the Flood Resilient Homes Program, Rebuild and Recover - Flood Resilient Communities Program and the Climate Adaptive Homes Program.

Brisbane Sustainability Agency are also working towards emissions reduction and mitigation efforts through our sustainability program of works, including the Resilient Clubs Support Program, Brisbane Carbon Challenge and the Sustainable Business Hub.

The Oxley Creek Transformation project is working towards restoring our ecosystem and natural services by rehabilitating the Oxley Creek Corridor, enhancing carbon uptake and storage.

2021-22 KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

• The continued delivery of eight key projects and programs to achieve sustainability outcomes for Brisbane residents, community groups and businesses, including:

Oxley Creek Transformation project Flood Resilient Homes Program **Resilient Clubs Support Program** Rebuild and Recover - Flood Resilient Communities Program Brisbane Carbon Challenge Climate Adaptive Homes Project Community Facilities Maintenance Program Sustainable Business Hub.

- 11 events were held with over 22,000 attendees, including the launch of the new Green Heart Fair program at Victoria Park.
- The opening of a 3.7km shared path at Archerfield Wetlands, giving the community access to this rare, natural beauty just 12km from the city.
- The commencement of the Rebuild and Recovery Flood Resilient Communities Program which connects Brisbane community and sporting clubs with experts in flood resilient building and construction techniques to ensure that Brisbane's suburban community hubs build back better following the February/March 2022 flood event.
- The launch of the Sustainable Business Hub which provides small and medium sized businesses in Brisbane tools, case studies, advice and offers to help lower their operational costs and environmental impact.
- Online community engagement activity was reached by audiences 766,200 times.





THE FEBRUARY/MARCH 2022 FLOOD EVENT

During the last weekend of February, Brisbane faced a record-breaking rainfall event, receiving more than 200 millimetres of rain each day over three consecutive days. While the resulting flood didn't reach the peak of the 2011 flood event, through the combination of river, creek and overland flow flooding it had a devastating impact, reaching areas of Brisbane that had previously never recorded flooding, with more than 23,000 properties affected.

In the immediate recovery, Brisbane Sustainability Agency rallied around the local community, helping clean up the heavily affected Corinda Pony Club and assisting the recovery efforts in the Rocklea suburban area.

The following months exposed how Brisbane Sustainability Agency's work delivering Council's





Flood Resilient Homes Pilot Program was crucial to the recovery of flood-affected program participants, with 89% of properties reporting positive outcomes of their flood resilience works following the severe weather event.

Brisbane Sustainability Agency also commenced a partnership with Council to contribute to the delivery of its Rebuild and Recover - Flood Resilient Communities Program, which was developed to build flood resilience back into the heart of Brisbane's suburban community and sporting clubs.

Brisbane Sustainability Agency will continue to work with Council to play a central role in helping Brisbane's residents and businesses build climate resilience.



OXLEY CREEK TRANSFORMATION PROJECT

In March 2016, Council announced the \$100 million Oxley Creek Transformation (OCT) project. Over 20 years, the OCT project will transform the Oxley Creek corridor, from the Brisbane River to Larapinta, into a world-class green, lifestyle and leisure destination.

Brisbane Sustainability Agency are developing and delivering this project on behalf of Brisbane City Council through engaging with the community and working with government, community members, bush care and catchment groups, local businesses, industry and residents to restore the natural ecosystem and develop a lively network of connected greenspaces along 20km of Oxley Creek.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

- Received development approval for the Archerfield Wetlands District Park in September 2021.
- Commenced the construction tender process in preparation for construction of the District Park in 2022/23.
- Constructed and opened the Archerfield Wetlands Discovery Trail, a 3-kilometrelong walking trail and wetlands lookout, in June 2022, providing the first opportunity for the community to experience this unique 150-hectare site.
- **Released the Graceville Riverside Parklands** Precinct Plan in February 2022, incorporating feedback received during the community consultation period.
- Completed the inaugural Oxley Creek annual social survey to understand how the community perceives and values the Oxley Creek corridor.
- Developed a collaborative, ongoing birdmonitoring program with BirdLife Southern Queensland and Birds Queensland at Archerfield Wetlands to measure impacts to bird numbers and diversity.
- Collaborated with Oxley Creek Catchment Association on one waterway clean up event .
- Continued to undertake monthly recreational water quality monitoring at three sites along Oxley Creek to identify changes in water quality over time.







FLOOD RESILIENT HOMES PILOT PROGRAM

The Flood Resilient Homes Pilot Program is designed to help residents prepare for, live through and recover from overland flow flooding.

Delivered by Brisbane Sustainability Agency on behalf of Council, participating residents of the program receive a free Home Service by floodresilience experts, followed by recommendations which may include works to increase the flood resilience of a property funded through the Incentive Scheme.

The program was put to the ultimate test in February 2022, with flood waters inundating properties all over Brisbane. However, postevent analysis showed that the interventions delivered as part of this program were crucial to participants' ability to recover quicker during this flood event.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

- Completed 47 home assessments, with 297 home assessments completed since the pilot programs' inception.
- Progressed Incentive Scheme works, with 34 properties' works complete, with 159 Incentive Scheme participants completed since the pilot programs' inception.
- Undertook a post-flood assessment report, which identified 89% of properties with completed resilience works reported positive outcomes following the February/March 2022 severe weather event.
- Commenced planning for the future flood resilience program, exploring the potential to support additional homeowners and businesses in 2022/23.
- Liaised with homeowners, insurers and external contractors following the February/ March 2022 severe weather event to support homeowners to build back better.







In 2011, Kevin 'Rusty' Adams' apartment was inundated with flood waters, requiring a 6-person clean up of the property which was uninhabitable for two weeks after the flood event.

Rusty joined the Flood Resilient Homes Pilot Program in 2018 and had received a home assessment, recommendations and over \$47,000 worth of funded flood-resilient works. When the 2022 flood waters rose higher than 2011, Rusty's apartment was prepared. Rusty was able to clean out the property and move back in within hours.

"I got it cleaned up so fast because of the skirting tiles [the program] put down... I was able to get a hose the next day and hose it out, room by room."





RESILIENT CLUBS SUPPORT PROGRAM

Brisbane Sustainability Agency delivers the Resilient Clubs Support Program on behalf of Council, servicing over 180 Brisbane community and sporting clubs.

Operating since 2020, the program aims to support over 260 clubs across Brisbane by 2024 to lower their environmental impact and resource use from energy, water and waste.

Expert audits, action plans, funded-works and coaching is provided to help participating clubs reduce their operation and maintenance costs, lower their environmental footprint and grow cost savings that can be invested back into their members, facilities and local community.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

• An additional 86 clubs joined the program in 2021/22, totalling 183 clubs participating in the program since its inception.



Bulimba Bowlo is a bustling community hub offering a lively, casual bar and dining area as well as a popular bare-foot bowls for friends and families to enjoy. As part of the Resilient Clubs Support Program, the club has received expert audits, recommendations and funded-works such as installation of a solar photovoltaic system, energy monitoring devices, tap-timers, efficient sprinkler heads and more. The benefits from the program are estimated to save Bulimba Bowlo 698,200L in water, 36,950kWh in energy and a reduction of \$8,820 in their operating costs.

"Energy and water use is a significant part of our costs. The introduction of solar energy reduces our reliance on the energy companies... we can reinvest that into the club to benefit the community." - Rod Jackson, Bulimba Bowlo

- Site energy and water efficiency audits were **completed at 127 clubs** in 2021/22, equating to 172 clubs participating in the audit process since the programs' inception.
- Provided coaching activities and resources to all participating clubs.
- Progressed major works at 85 participating clubs in 2021/22, providing a total of 90 sites that have been supported through the program with major works, which included up to \$10,000 worth of irrigation, energy or plumbing upgrades per site.
- Continued to develop tailored action plans and post-program assessments, allowing clubs to incorporate sustainability into their strategic planning.
- Installed 26 solar systems at participating clubs in 2021/22, contributing to 48 solar systems installed through the program, equating to 895.3kW installed capacity, reducing the carbon emissions equivalent of removing about 380 cars off the road each year.



REBUILD AND RECOVER - FLOOD RESILIENT COMMUNITIES PROGRAM

Due to their location in low-lying areas, sporting and community clubs have experienced disproportional destruction and devastation. It is estimated that approximately 300 Council-leased sporting and community clubs were impacted by the February/March 2022 severe weather event.

As a result, Council introduced the Rebuild and Recover Flood Resilient Communities Program to support flood-affected community clubs to better understand their estimated flood level and risk, as well as providing site specific recommendations to encourage building back better through opportunities to reduce future flooding impacts. Brisbane Sustainability Agency was proud to deliver this initiative on behalf of Council.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

- Completed **102 flood resilience assessments** and recommendations reports at selected that experienced flooding in February/March 2022.
- Provided flood resilience resources to increase awareness around flood risk, educate on the principles of flood resilience and promote building back better to reduce the impacts of future flooding.
- Developed a Flood Management Plan template for community facilities to assist them to 'Prepare- Respond-Recover' from a flood event. This was designed to help community facilities return to their key activities as quickly as possible after a flood event.
- Delivered coaching webinars to help clubs recover their turf following a flood event and to provide guidance on completing a Flood Management Plan for their site.



BRISBANE CARBON CHALLENGE

The Brisbane Carbon Challenge is an initiative of Council and is proudly delivered by Brisbane Sustainability Agency. The challenge encourages and supports residents to understand and reduce their household carbon footprint and save money on their household bills at the same time. The challenge aims to reduce household emissions from the current average of 11.55 tonnes, to six tonnes by 2031.

The challenge offers Brisbane residents an online carbon calculator, low-carbon actions and resources to help them understand and reduce their home energy, transport and waste emissions.

To demonstrate the potential of the program, in 2021, 20 champion households were selected to take the Challenge to reduce their emissions by 50% and demonstrate their experiences along the way. Champion households were supported with installation of home energy monitoring system, an in-home assessment, a tailored action plan and one-on-one coaching.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

- 943 residents completed the carbon calculator in 2021-22, bring the total number of residents completing the carbon calculator to 2,498 from September 2020 to June 2022.
- 18 Champion Households completed the Carbon Challenge, with an average emissions reduction of 55% across home energy, transport and waste. Five of these champion households exceeded a 75% reduction.
- Promotion across a range of channels including a feature in Tim Minchin's Tour Green Guide, 4EB radio station, Real Estate News and the Green Heart Fair.
- Commenced planning for the future program, with the goals to encourage residents to reduce their carbon footprint using the practical tools and initiatives undertaken by champion households.

Heidi Morris and her daughters became a 'Champion Household' of the Brisbane Carbon Challenge in 2021. They were supported by Brisbane Sustainability Agency to reduce their household carbon emissions with webinars and calls, resources, coaching emails, action plans and support items across home energy, water and waste. The Morris family took many actions through the program, such as switching to 100% renewable energy (GreenPower), starting composting their food waste, reducing their vehicle use with an e-bike and changing their behaviours at home to become more energy efficient.

By doing this, the Morris family reduced their carbon footprint by 78% within a year!



The Boyd family reduced their household carbon footprint by 83%.

CLIMATE ADAPTIVE HOMES PROGRAM

NRMA Insurance, supported through its parent company IAG, partnered with Brisbane Sustainability Agency in 2020 on the Climate Adaptive Homes project. The project aims to identify, develop and test a series of solutions and initiatives to help homeowners in South East Queensland communities be better prepared for severe weather events, such as storms, floods and bushfires.

In 2022, Brisbane Sustainability Agency delivered Storm Check pilot project – a trial assessment program offered to a group of homeowners in South-East Queensland that aimed to identify ways to make their properties more resilient to severe storms and to understand what motivates homeowners to act on the recommendations of the resilience experts.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

- **40 home assessments completed** to identify opportunities to improve property storm resilience.
- The most commonly recommended actions related to roof drainage system, site water management, window protection, and property maintenance.
- **74% took action** within six months of their assessment.
- 55% of participants reported an increase in the value they placed on storm resilience after they participated in Storm Check pilot project. Participants reported the February/ March 2022 rain event as an influencing factor.
- Progressed planning for opportunities to build on the success of the Storm Check pilot project, and identify future partnership and collaboration opportunities between Brisbane Sustainability Agency and IAG/ NRMA Insurance.

COMMUNITY FACILITIES MAINTENANCE PROGRAM

In April 2022, Brisbane Sustainability Agency concluded Council's Community Facilities Maintenance Program.

Aligned to the Resilient Clubs Support Program, this program offered Brisbane City Council community leased facilities building and roof audits to assess the condition, maintenance requirements and remaining lifespan data, along with opportunities for improving building performance, including storm resilience and thermal performance, and sustainability opportunities, including assessment for the potential of solar installation in the future.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

- 45 building and roof audits completed on Council community leased facilities.
- 37 sites identified as suitable for solar installation.
- **17 sites subsequently received a solar system** installation through the Resilient Clubs Support Program.
- Additional sites audits through this program will be considered for solar system installation in the future.









SUSTAINABLE BUSINESS HUB

As an initiative supported by Council's Economic Recovery Taskforce, Brisbane Sustainability Agency developed and launched the Sustainable Business Hub, an online platform developed to help businesses reduce their operational costs and environmental footprint from energy, waste and waste.

With online tools, advice, solutions, case studies and special offers, small and medium businesses in Brisbane can access a pool of knowledge to help save on bills.





Key achievements in 2021-22:

- New wedsite and energy calculator tool developed and launched, successfully connecting small and medium businesses with quick wins and smart investments to save on energy, waste and water consumption and costs.
- 1,702 homepage views since the launch.
- 83% of on-page survey responses reported being satisfied or very satisfied with the usefulness of the content.

GREEN HEART FAIR

Brisbane Sustainability Agency proudly delivered Brisbane's favourite sustainability festival, the Green Heart Fair (fair) in partnership with Council.

The fair featured over 120 of Brisbane's leading sustainability experts who shared practical tips and tricks to help residents live a more ecofriendly life. Visitors were treated to sustainability displays, workshops, eco-friendly products, free native plants, artisan markets, live entertainment, food trucks and more at the free, family and dogfriendly events.

This year the fair was held at Brisbane's newest green space, Victoria Park / Barrambin for the first time.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

- 15,000 estimated visitors.
- 3,000 native plants were given away.
- 120 sustainable exhibitors, displays and workshops.
- 1.76m media impressions.
- Connection with 285,000 people through social media channels.
- 1,600 litres of event organic waste was composted and diverted from landfill.
- 100% compostable serveware used at the event.
- Solar powered stages.

The whole family can enjoy fun, educational

This year's Green Heart Fair had an attendee satisfaction rate of 98%, with 52% of attendees being first-time visitors this year.

GREEN HEART FAIR POP UP EVENTS

In response to the Covid-19 impacts within the community, Brisbane Sustainability Agency transformed the September 2021 Green Heart Fair into a virtual Fair and delivered a series of pop-up events during Green Heart week across Brisbane. Three pop up events were delivered, which was supported by the online fair, including DIY videos, tips from experts, exclusive product deals and offers.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

- Online fair received 4,157 website visits and reached 135,872 people on social media.

- 3,000 native plants given away through the Green Heart week pop-up events.

WASTESMART BRISBANE **AWARDS**

Since 2017, Brisbane Sustainability Agency has proudly delivered the WasteSMART Brisbane Awards (formerly, Cleaner Suburbs Awards) on behalf of Council. These awards celebrate the achievements of those in the Brisbane community who undertake 'waste smart' activities and practices to create a clean and green Brisbane.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

- 252 nominations received for the 2021 WasteSMART Brisbane Awards over eight award categories.
- 3,751 votes received from the public voting category.
- 11 WasteSMART Awards awarded, with a prize pool worth over \$4,000.
- Sponsor partnerships with IKEA, Cleanaway, Containers for Change Queensland and the University of Queensland.
- 7, Officeworks, Urban Utilities and Brandition.

SUSTAINABILITY AND SCIENCE SHOWCASE 2022

The Office of the Queensland Chief Scientist partnered with Brisbane Sustainability Agency to host the second annual Sustainability and Science Showcase in June 2022. This event was held at the Queensland Museum, and highlights the latest research, actions and ideas to help Queenslanders joining in citizen science to do their bit to protect the planet.

Key achievements in 2021-22:

• 2,500 attendees visited the displays and forums, which provided an opportunity for the community to engage with Queensland's leading organisations, researchers and

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) General Information

(i) Reporting entity and basis of preparation

Brisbane Sustainability Agency Pty Ltd (the 'Company') is a company limited by shares, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. BSA, formerly Brisbane Green Heart CitySmart Pty Ltd, changed it's registered company name on 18 June 2021.

The address of the registered office is Level 8, 307 Queen Street, Brisbane, QLD 4000.

The principal place of business in Level 8 Suite 2, 307 Queen Street, Brisbane, QLD 4000.

The Company's sole principal activity is to support the delivery of greater sustainability outcomes for Brisbane. The company is a not for profit proprietary company limited by shares. The company is wholly owned by the Brisbane City Council; therefore the Brisbane City Council is the parent entity of Brisbane Sustainability Agency Pty Ltd.

No dividends have been paid or declared throughout the 2022 financial year.

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with *Australian Accounting Standards* (AASBs) adopted by the *Australian Accounting Standards Board* (AASB) and the *Corporations Act 2001*. The financial statements have been authorised for issue by the Board of Directors as at the date of signing the directors' declaration.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in notes.

The financial statements are presented in the Australian dollar, which is the Company's functional currency.

(b) Use of estimates and judgements

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that may have a financial impact on the entity and that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(b) Use of estimates and judgements (continued)

Where circumstances change, management have the discretion to adjust their estimates and judgements accordingly in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods as relevant. Estimates and assumptions that have a potential effect are outlined in the following accounting policies and subsequent notes relating to:

- plant and equipment, including the annual review of depreciation rates, assets' lives and residual value; and
- employee benefits of annual leave and long service leave.

(c) Taxation

(i) Income tax

The company is exempt from Commonwealth Income Tax as a State/Territory Body under *Section 24AK* of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1936*.

(ii) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cash flow on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

The net amount of GST recoverable from or payable to the Australian Taxation Office is included as part of the receivables or payables.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(d) Going concern

The financial report has been prepared on the going concern basis. This basis has been adopted as the Company should receive ongoing funding through Funding Deeds that support the Company from Brisbane City Council to fund the operation.

Funding agreements are in place between the Company and Brisbane City Council which outlines the parameters for the Company receiving and using grant funding. Funding agreements outlines that Brisbane City Council does not guarantee any future grants and that the Company will need to apply for funds in the budget submission process each year.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the Company.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the Company's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. I base my conclusions on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease to continue as a going concern.



• Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with the Company's directors regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.
